The construction of a new church building was interrupted by the war, so our forebearers met in the newly constructed scout hall. When building resumed, construction used post-war materials. Generally, materials were not up to standard, undercooked bricks, for example.

Fairfield United began its life, as a church plant from the Metropolitan Methodist Church; you may know it as the Victoria Conservatory of music. We were known as the Moss Street mission. It began as a large white school tent with a wooden floor; the first worship service took place in April

Gaye Sharpe and the congregation at that time did not get that memo because new life emerged.

Interior of the Sanctuary was renovated. Church hall was renovated.

UCC and Anglican were discussing an amalgamation pulpit exchanges happened.

Meetings with representatives from James Bay, Belmont United, Oak Bay, and Fairfield to discuss mutual problems of aging and diminishing congregations. Emerging was a conversation about outreach to the neighbourhood and the community for young families. There was no follow-up. Many Justice making projects such as support of the creation of Our Place.
